Achieving Excellence

Together in the Classroom: Teaching, Learning and the Curriculum

At Cansfield, we offer a broad and balanced curriculum which enables pupils to develop lifelong knowledge, skills and attributes to accompany them as they move to life beyond Cansfield. Pupils are encouraged to take ownership of their own learning and develop resilience as they mature. The curriculum has been designed by subject experts, often working with a range of external curriculum specialists. It is constantly reviewed and evaluated, ensuring it is relevant and purposeful for the current context.

In years 7 – 9 students study a full range of subjects:

- English, Reading and Drama
- Maths
- Science
- Geography
- History
- Citizenship, Religion and Careers
- Life Studies
- French
- PE
- Music
- Art
- Design Technology
- Food
- Computing

In English we have a purposefully sequenced, knowledge-rich and ambitious curriculum that inspires curiosity and engages our young people in critical thinking. Following a broadly chronological structure, our curriculum aims to show learners that literature, art and culture are a product of the time in which they were created. Our curriculum empowers our students by developing their social and cultural capital and enabling them to participate fully in academic conversation. Our English learners are thinkers – reflecting upon their society and our world and their place within it. English at Cansfield advance our students' core skills and knowledge in reading, writing and spoken language to ensure that they are able to communicate effectively in all situations, with an





understanding and appreciation of the wider world, culture and their role within it, through the study of literature and language.

To broaden the understanding and appreciation that our students have of culture and diversity we study a range of interesting literature texts across the five years. We believe that the study of literature and language within cultural and historical contexts challenges students to articulate and defend ideas, to appreciate ideas different from their own, and to respect diversity and how ideas and concepts have changed and transformed over time. This develops and prepares students to be lifelong learners, ensuring that they have a voice and a role within their community and society beyond secondary school.

English

Beyond the classroom, we nurture a love of creativity in our students through an understanding and appreciation of literature and language to allow them to flourish in future careers and in the community once they leave Cansfield. In addition to our curriculum we offer a wealth of opportunities and experiences to further enhance their appreciation and love of English: theatre visits, author workshops, visits from poets, and links with the local primary schools are just some of the activities that our Faculty participates in.







Maths

Our aim in the Mathematics Faculty at Cansfield High School is to cultivate a stimulating and challenging learning environment, where all students can thrive and become competent users of mathematics and mathematical application.

We endeavour to accomplish students with a foundation for lifelong learning, critical thinking, and technical problem solving, through an innovative, well-balanced and dynamic mastery curriculum. Students are encouraged to persevere and be resilient learners as they actively engage and become successful, independent mathematicians. Mathematics is all around us in everyday life. It is vital our students have a fundamental understanding of mathematics in order to thrive in their lives after school. To accomplish this, we ensure the disciplinary skills of fluency, mathematical reasoning and problem solving are intertwined into lessons within every concept; beyond that; our tasks deliberately present maths in scientific, financial and other real-world contexts.

Science

Our Key Stage 3 science curriculum builds on the foundations of primary science and prepares students for the deeper study of scientific ideas at GCSE. It introduces learners to the three main disciplines—biology, chemistry and physics—while also emphasising the importance of working scientifically, problem-solving, and linking knowledge to real-world applications.

Biology involves students exploring the structure and function of living organisms, including cells, tissues and organ systems, and consider how these systems work together to keep organisms alive. They study reproduction and growth in plants and animals, the principles of inheritance and variation, and the role of evolution in shaping life on Earth. Some topics in Chemistry include students being introduced to the particle model of matter, gaining an understanding of states of matter and changes between them. They explore the structure of the atom, elements, compounds and mixtures, and how chemical reactions take place. In Physics, the curriculum focuses on the fundamental principles that govern the physical world. Pupils study forces and motion, including gravity, friction, pressure and speed.

Across all three disciplines, pupils develop skills in scientific enquiry. They learn to ask questions, form hypotheses, plan and carry out experiments, collect and interpret data, and evaluate evidence. Mathematical skills—such as using units, handling graphs, and working with formulae—are embedded to strengthen scientific understanding.

The Key Stage 3 curriculum encourages curiosity about the natural and physical world, equips students with the tools to think critically about evidence, and lays the groundwork for further study in science and related fields.



History

The History curriculum at Cansfield is an in depth, broad study of world history and British History. Our approach is centred chronology around and pupils understanding the concept of place in time. We feel it is important for students to understand how our world was built and how it has changed and developed. From year 7-9 we cover a vast and wide range of knowledge that fulfils and goes beyond standard historical concepts, taking pupils from Celtic Britain to the end of the Cold War. Within each year there are 6 key themes that interweave through the chronology; power, conflict, social, economic, religion and representation. These themes allow students to make connections and think deeper about the information in front of them. These themes also allow for the students to explore historical skills like significance and causation to slot together factors and facts to create the context of the world they live in, additional to knowing History's great stories to develop their substantive knowledge. We pride ourselves at Cansfield of having an ever-evolving curriculum that is fully inclusive and progressive.







Geography

The Geography curriculum at Cansfield takes a thematic approach. In Year 7, the students build a sense of their place in the world by studying a variety of contrasting countries such as Iceland, Russia, China, and Kenya.

In Year 8, students begin to understand the geographic issues facing the world such as Climate Change, River Flooding and the threats facing Ecosystems. In Year 9, students then explore how the world is changing, allowing them to draw all of their knowledge together, by looking at Desertification, the growth Global Cities, and conflict in The Middle East. The curriculum is designed to allow them to revisit key themes such as weather & climate, physical processes, and development throughout the whole of KS3, gradually building on their knowledge to become well-rounded geographers.

Citizenship, Religion and Careers

In Citizenship, Religion and Careers we then take a chronological approach to teaching the Abrahamic faiths (Judaism, Christianity & Islam) in year 7 followed by the Dharmic faiths (Hinduism, Buddhism and Sikhism), before looking at non-religious worldviews in **year 8.** This gives the pupils a journey through the major six world religions to understand diverse and different religions, beliefs and practices. This allows pupils to take a philosophical approach in year 9 looking at ethical and moral issues, applying religious perspectives and building on the prior learning from their religion topics from the previous two years and building on knowledge in an age approach manner. With this, our pupils will be able to develop their debate skills, independent thinking skills and tolerance and respect. We follow the Lancashire agreed syllabus and go beyond this by extending our topics to cover a wide range of religions, morality and ideologies. At KS4 we offer the AQA GCSE Religious Studies.

Citizenship, Religion and Careers

At Cansfield we have a customised, inclusive and progressive curriculum from year 7 through to year 11.

The aim of the curriculum in CRE is to ensure that pupils are ready for life outside of Cansfield in their personal life, family life, communities, UK society and as a global citizen. Life Studies covers a range of subjects including; Personal, Social, Health and Economic Education (PSHE), Citizenship, and Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG), and is a cornerstone to a robust, diverse and comprehensive educational curriculum. Students cover six topics each year in the same order, these build on the previous years following a clear, age-appropriate model to allow progress in the subject. Pupils will learn about how to foster and maintain healthy friendships, online safety, law-making and politics, and how to manage money. Our educational aim is to foster informed and independent citizens who can actively participate in the country's political processes, make positive lifestyle choices, and improve their future life chances. In addition to these subjects, the curriculum fosters cross-curricular links with subjects across the school, benefitting both pupil learning and awareness of the world. At KS4 we offer BTÉC Health and Social Care to allow pupils to develop further in career options that include human lifespan and development, caring for others and understanding human behaviour.



French

At Cansfield, the French curriculum is designed to broaden students' understanding other cultures. enhance their communication skills, and build confidence and independence in language learning. We dedicate two hours each week to French, allowing students to fully immerse themselves in the language. By the end of Year 9, students will have a solid foundation in French. Topics include: personal details, descriptions, family, pets, celebrity culture, and free time. Moving to a comparison of cultures, festivals and media all with key grammar points woven through. Furthermore, we offer a residential trip to Lille to build confidence in using French for real purposes.

Students develop listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills through regular assessments and progress checks. They will: identify and use tenses and key grammatical structures; translate between French and English; participate in speaking and listening activities. Our French lessons equip students with communication skills useful in today's global community, preparing them for future success.





Music

We believe that every pupil is entitled to a broad and balanced music education. Music can evoke emotion, develop sensitivity, build confidence, resilience and inspire creativity and we aim to encourage our pupils through classroom music making and beyond. Throughout the KS3 music curriculum pupils will be taught skills on a variety of different instruments through solo and ensemble performances. Pupils will develop their creativity in composition through the use of Digital Audio Software and traditional methods of music making. Over the course of the three years different styles of music will be created, developed and performed to support the three pillars of musicianship. Enrichment opportunities are available for all pupils which include: Choir, band and the chance to take part in our concerts and whole school production.

P.E.

The PE department inspires pupils by developing their confidence and expression through physical literacy instilling lifelong skills for continued participation.

KS3 PE is a conceptual curriculum approach which offers an alternative to the traditional sport and skills based. Personal and social development plus leadership skills are fundamental when becoming a well-rounded sportsperson and we teach these concepts throughout the course. Pupils will also learn how to become competent and then excel in a variety of sports over the three-year curriculum. These include: Football, rugby, dance, gymnastics, trampoline skills, athletics, table tennis and many more. There are a variety of enrichment opportunities for pupils to participate in, including sporting fixtures, lunchtime and afterschool clubs and trips.

These subjects deliver opportunities for a range of distinct creative provision which have long been an integral part of Cansfield's major achievements. We have an inspiring and dedicated teaching team of educators that have a passion for not only their discipline, but for the wider school and support the unique creative and nurturing ethos of Cansfield, ensuring we enhance students' visual language, as well as their understanding of a range of skills, knowledge and understanding, which enables them to translate their thoughts and ideas into creative outcomes. This is ensured through the exciting and creative curriculum that we offer our students, as they are encouraged to experience a wide range of topics.

At Key Stage 3 we deliver a broad creative curriculum in which skills are embedded and taught with rigour which enables our students to experience an extensive range of materials, techniques and processes. In Art, we study Great British art and art movements such as Anthony Gormley and Paula Rego. In Food, we look at nutrition and a safe working kitchen as well as making lots of delicious food such as flapjacks and stir fry.

In Computing, the importance of staying safe online runs through the curriculum as well as programming and designing. Finally, in Design and Technology, there is an iterative element to design using CAD/CAM and the laser cutter.





Creative

There is a large uptake for subjects in the Creative Faculty at Key Stage Four, with students being supported throughout the exam process with after school drop in sessions, one to one practical tuition and extended holiday workshops. Critical understanding is further developed by trips to relevant exhibitions and visiting industry practitioners. Many Cansfield students go on to select a creative career pathway after leaving Cansfield and their successes are testament to the contribution the Creative Faculty has made to the creativity of students past and present. In years 10 and 11, pupils follow a more specialised curriculum in their areas of choice which builds on the foundations of Key Stage Three. We offer a diverse curriculum to cater for pupils' interests and needs this includes a range of GCSEs and BTECs.

Food

In Food, we provide students with a comprehensive understanding of the hospitality industry while developing practical food preparation and service skills. The curriculum blends academic knowledge with vocational training to prepare learners for careers in hospitality or further study. This includes: knife skills; catering for good nutrition and for dietary needs; cooking methods and presentation; working with a variety of ingredients and cuisines and menu planning. We also cook some amazing food such as fish and chips, cakes, puddings, flapjacks and stir-fries.

Computing

In Computing, the importance of staying safe online runs through the curriculum as well as programming and designing. The curriculum aims to equip students with the skills and understanding needed to thrive in a digital world. It balances computer science, information technology, and digital literacy, preparing students to become confident, responsible, and capable digital citizens. Amongst other things, students will: understand how computers work, e.g. binary, logic gates, hardware components; design, write, and debug programs using text-based languages like Python; develop computational thinking: decomposition, pattern recognition, abstraction, and algorithms and evaluate and apply information technology to solve real-world problems.

Design and Technology

The (DT) curriculum provides students with the knowledge, skills, and creativity to design and make products that solve real-world problems. It encourages innovation, critical thinking, and an understanding of materials, tools, and technologies. Our curriculum aims to develop creative, technical, and practical skills to perform everyday tasks confidently so students can build and apply a repertoire of knowledge to design, make, and evaluate products. They will also respond to design briefs, be inspired by famous designers and consider technological advances using a wide range of materials and tools whilst working safely and accurately.

There is a vast array of extra-curricular clubs designed to suit every individuals' needs. Pastoral Care and Guidance

At Cansfield we have a strong pastoral system to support your child. The Pastoral Team aims to ensure that the climate for learning at Cansfield High School is a positive one, where all children feel safe, encouraged, and supported to do their best. We strive to encourage all students to be responsible, moral, and well-rounded citizens who are ready to face the outside world and are equipped with all they need to be successful when they leave us. We seek to build positive relationships with every student and their families, and we are committed to support each student every day. All pupils are welcomed into school on the school gate and their successes are celebrated as they leave school. The welcome into school each day allows our team to check on our student's welfare, to support them with any concerns and to prepare them for a positive day of learning. Throughout the day we support our students with any issues that may arise and focus our efforts in visiting lessons, as well as building strong relationships with them. The Pastoral Team's approach is a child centred one and we are passionate in our belief that all our students can achieve and be successful.

We aim to build strong relationships with parents and outside agencies to create a supportive culture for our students. Some families and students may need additional support and we work with individuals to ensure a tailored approach to remove barriers to learning, including mental health and well-being support, Designated Mental Health Leads, Mental Health First Aiders (MHFA), and an onsite counsellor who works with students if they are being affected by issues including anxiety, bereavement, and depression. The Pastoral Team works closely with other agencies in Wigan to support our students during their time at Cansfield.

Our Pastoral Team includes five non-teaching Heads of Year and a number of pastoral workers who are responsible for the safety, wellbeing and nurture of their year group. The Pastoral Team are highly trained in safeguarding and are alert to the needs of all our students. The school also has an Attendance Officer and an Attendance Administrator who work closely with pupils, parents, and outside agencies to maintain high standards of attendance.

In Key Stage 3 the enrichment curriculum introduces our students to the world of work, encouraging them to explore a range of potential careers culminating in an initial career plan. As the curriculum spirals, students build upon prior learning and use this to understand their place in the world and what options are available to develop a bespoke set of career pathways. Once these are established the focus is drawn to identifying and developing employability skills through the creation of a curriculum vitae and gaining an understanding of labour market. Students will undertake opportunities such as; careers meetings with our careers advisor, attend careers fairs, guest speakers, alumni carousels, national apprenticeship week, virtual work experience, options evenings and university and college trips.

In Key Stage 4 students will start to forge their bespoke career pathways and refine skills and knowledge through mock interviews and work experience, helping them gain an edge. They will explore life after Cansfield and understand the importance of achieving grades necessary to pursue their pathway, receive personal advice and support to achieve this along the way.
